## Alice Springs designed and made chairs to be showcased in Venice

Sixteen Anerle-aneme chairs are on their way to the 2016 Venice Architecture Biennale.

The International Architecture Exhibition will be held in the Italian city from May to November 2016. It is widely considered to be the most prestigious international event on the architectural calendar. It was established in 1980 and is held every alternate year to the Venice Art Biennale.

The chairs will form part of the exhibition 'The Pool' conceived by this year's Creative Directors of Australia's Exhibition - Amelia Holliday and Isabelle Toland (Aileen Sage Architects) with Michelle Tabet.

Australia's Exhibition 'The Pool', will explore Australia's architecture, landscape, culture and identity through our unique connection to pools. Stories around a number of the Northern Territory's natural pools as well as pools in remote communities are being featured as part of the exhibition.

The *Anerle-aneme* chair is designed by Alice Springs based designer Elliat Rich and fabricated by Aboriginal employees in the Centre for Appropriate Technology's Enterprise Workshop.

The chair builds on an earlier successful collaboration in the design and fabrication of the 1888 Benches, public seating installed as part of the Alice Springs Todd Mall upgrade.

Anerle-aneme means 'sit a little while' in the local Arrernte language of central Australia. The chair is made of steel and features a slatted seat and back rest, powder coated in four colours resonant of the central Australia landscape – blue, ochre, green and grey – and framed in black.

The chair is designed for style, comfort and outdoor resilience – a perfect pool side addition.

"The chair showcases the success of a collaboration that has brought together the stories and skills of central Australia. The use of durable materials, a contemporary design aesthetic and local fabrication are a good indication of what kind of product we might see more of in the future" said Elliat Rich.

The chairs will be placed poolside in Australia's new pavilion in Venice at the Biennale and on the open deck.

"The 'Anerle -aneme' chair highlights what can be achieved through creative collaboration between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Territorians. Our staff have gained skills and confidence and our innovation will be demonstrated to the world" the Centre for Appropriate Technology's CEO Steve Rogers said.
